Keep safe this Christmas

At a time where many are focusing on giving, it's even more important to help protect ourselves and others from those who are more intent on taking.

PCSPs are an integral part of keeping our communities safe and have been active getting out some key safety message across our communities.



Keep safe online

Many people make the most of festive sales to get those bigticket gifts. This also means more opportunities for scammers behind our computer screens. Even the most seasoned online shoppers may find themselves drawn in to a too-good-to-be-true deal as the financial reality of Christmas shopping takes hold.

When you're shopping online...

- Vary your password for each site, and log out when you're done.
- Double check your address bar for a lock symbol so you know the site's secure.
- Only buy from websites you know and trust, and that have official company pages.
- Don't share personal information online that you don't need to.

Keep your home safe

A lot of us spend Christmas either out at the shops or visiting friends and family – which can mean an empty house. It's easy when you're rushing around to forget the simple things that are normally second nature, and unfortunately, even at Christmas, there are criminals waiting to take advantage.

When you head out...

- Remember to lock all of your doors and windows.
- Put away those presents even

- Mark your valuables with your postcode/house number to make them easier to track. Don't forget to take photos too.
- Always ensure your car is locked and any parcels hidden away.

Keep yourself safe

Chilling out and hanging out with family and friends become priorities for a lot of us at Christmas, but it's important to remember that staying safe should never budge from the top spot. PCSPs and the PSNI are constantly reminding people of simple ways to stay safe, and it's particularly important during the festive period when we're all a little more relaxed.

When you're out and about...

- Never, ever drink and drive.
- Plan your journey home and your journey the next day if you've been drinking, you could still be over the limit even if you think you aren't.
- Remember even one drink affects your judgement, even if you think it doesn't. Your decision-making abilities take a hit when y ou take a drink.
- Ask yourself "do I feel safe?" while you're out, and while you're on your way home. Drinking can bring defences down and leave people more vulnerable.
- Stay in bright, well-lit and busy areas when walking. Look after your valuables such as bags and mobile phones.

Road Safe Roadshow

Young people are involved in the highest number of road traffic collisions where someone is killed or seriously injured in Northern Ireland, and 16-24 year olds account for 21% of all recorded incidents.

Statistics like these are why road safety is such a major focus for PCSPs - and why Derry & Strabane PCSP used Road Safety Week this year to bring 1200 young people a stark warning as they start their journeys as drivers.

The Roadsafe Roadshow, put together by the PCSP and partner agencies Northern Ireland Ambulance Service, PSNI, NIFRS, Roadsafe NI, Life After and the

Donegal Road Safety Authority, depicts how a night out can end in tragedy – with sections of the story told by different emergency service personnel. The young people heard about the real-life consequences of a collision from a young person who was paralysed following a crash, and a young man who was imprisoned for causing the death of another person while he was driving.

Cross-community outreach

Derry & Strabane PCSP have supported the Brigade Cricket Club by funding a scheme to get young people to spend more time involved in sports that at antisocial behaviour hotspots.

Through the workshops, young people learned about the implications of antisocial behaviour on their lives and the lives of those around them. They were able to get to know plenty of people from different backgrounds, break down stereotypes and change attitudes about themselves, others and their behaviour.

Motorbike Awareness

Following issues in their local area around illegal use of scramblers and quads, Armagh, Banbridge & Craigavon PCSP have been working with partners to create a Motorbike Awareness Programme (MAP), which teaches young people about motorcycle safety. The project was developed with Ulster Grand Prix, Department of Justice, Department for Communities, Cornerstone Off-Road Motorcycle Academy and Council Sports Development.
