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ENGAGING WITH YOUNG PEOPLE

Fancy a seat on the Youth Council?

Lisburn and Castlereagh are recruiting new members of the Youth Council to have their say on local issues.

Lisburn & Castlereagh PCSP and partners have run the Council for the past two years, and its aim is to tackle concerns about antisocial behaviour across the district. It provide a forum for the PCSP, PSNI, Council and other agencies to work in a more sustainable way with young people, involving them in the development of policy and services, and giving them a voice. The Youth Council is made up of 24 members between the ages of 16 and 21 who are involved in:

- engaging with key decision makers
- having their say on local issue
- representing the views of other young people
- building confidence in setting out young people's views and opinions
- accredited training and developing their own personal skills.



Take a Byte

Young people around Derry and Strabane have been breaking down barriers and engaging with the PSNI thanks to the Bytes Project and the local PCSP.

The Bytes Project is designed to promote awareness of mental health, understanding of community safety, and confidence in policing. Working directly with the PSNI and funded by Derry & Strabane PCSP, the "Policing Day – Breaking Down Barriers" initiative saw 30 young people spend the day at Maydown PSNI station building positive attitudes towards services and policing in their community.

100% of those who attended said they got a better understanding of the role of the PSNI in their community, and that the interactions had led to a change in their attitude towards the police. Attitude change towards PSNI

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Motoring on

Mid & East Antrim PCSP have committed to improving road safety in their District, and have been working with New Driver NI to educate young people about all things motoring, with a focus on keeping themselves safe.

Inexperience can make driving daunting when you've just passed your test, which is why the project focuses on drivers between the ages of 17 and 20, delivering award-winning interactive presentations covering everything from picking a driving instructor and buying your first car, to penalty points, collisions, and how to keep your car road-worthy.

Turning down the pressure

Youth First, a project funded by Derry & Strabane PCSP has been tackling issues at the interface areas between the Bogside, the Brandywell and the Fountain Estate in the city.

The project provides positive alternatives to anti-social, risk-taking and sectarian behaviours for young people aged between 10 and 18, keeping them engaged and fostering relationships between communities. Alongside workshops, Youth First also hosts diversionary activities at times of high tension.

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KICKING OUT CRIME



If you can't do the crime...

Mid & East Antrim PCSP are focusing on helping vulnerable people keep themselves safe. Working with their local PSNI Crime Prevention Officer, they've developed free kits to help people feel safer in their homes.

The kits included items like door and keyring alarms, as well as door and window jammers. Padlocks, torches, digital safes and sensor lights will also be made available to residents.

Community outreach

Derry & Strabane PCSP's Community Safety Wardens have been out and about engaging with the local community through the North West Regional College's Freshers' Fair and Foyle Women's Information Network's Information Event this month.

The Wardens did a quick survey of what people knew about the scheme and found that 98% of people felt safer because of its existence.





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KEEPING COMMUNITIES SAFER





Track and trace

Mid & East Antrim Drugs and Alcohol Steering group has been working to reduce the amount of needles and syringes on the streets.

Extern, a key member of the steering group has developed STARS: Syringe Tracking and Recovery Service. Its idea is simple - if someone finds an IV needle, they call Extern who will come and dispose of it. This means that the number of needles found can be tracked and hotspots identified so that Extern can begin organising responsive actions where they're most needed.

Many of us have seen Neighbourhood Watch signs posted around our areas, but do you know who's looking out for your local parks?

In Armagh, Banbridge & Craigavon, the local PCSP has been working with the PSNI and park staff to create Park Watch, designed to protect our green areas from vandalism and anti-social behaviour. There are currently 17 active schemes within the District, and the most recent kicked off with a staff visit to the park to let the public know all about how it works.



Fermanagh & Omagh PCSP have been working with the PSNI, NIFRS, Social Services and the South West Age Partnership to help vulnerable people living with complex medical conditions stay in their homes for longer.

The initiative focuses on rural and isolated areas and involves giving residents wearable alarms with additional sensors, linked via phone to a monitoring centre. If there are any issues, the resident can press on the alarm to alert an advisor in the monitoring centre who can respond and arrange for additional help if needed.

One local user, Mrs Armstrong (pictured), recently made use of the alarm when her husband fell at home – the advisor at the monitoring centre contacted both the emergency services and her family, keeping her calm and providing peace of mind.

Retail Crimewatch goes digital

Over 400 retailers have signed up to become members of Retail Crimewatch, a partnership between Belfast City Centre Management, retailers and the PSNI.

As part of the crime reduction project, members are sent digital images of convicted shoplifters across Northern Ireland, allowing them to issue Exclusion Orders which means they can bar them from their premises for a year.

Explaining the benefits of Retail Crimewatch, Chief Superintendent Jonathan Roberts, said:

"The scheme is delivering tangible, measurable results. To date, there have been 42 successful convictions resulting in 20 custodial sentences for burglary involving prolific offenders, helping to create a safer environment for staff, customers and the public. We look forward to continuing this work with Belfast City Centre Management and our partners in the business and retail sectors as we seek out ways to develop this important service which helps prevent crime and keep people safe and I would encourage all businesses to consider joining the scheme."

Federation of Small Businesses (FSB) NI Development Manager, Mairaid McMahon is encouraging all businesses to complete a survey to help capture the true impact of business crime across Northern Ireland. She said: **"The average cost of a crime to a business is almost £3,000, and when additional negative impacts such as reputational damage, lost time and delayed business activity are factored in, it quickly adds up to a significant** barrier to growth, or in the worst cases a threat to their survival. Having worked with the Business Crime Partnership we know that tackling these crimes are a priority for the justice system, but we need a stronger evidence base to ensure that resources are being targeted effectively. "

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All responses are anonymous, and the findings will be used by the Business Crime Partnership to improve their Business Crime Action Plan.
